However, under this legislation, if a Governing Body receives a petition from parents of registered pupils at the school requesting that a meeting takes place this request must be acceded to if the following conditions are met;

- The petition contains the signatures of (either) ten percent of the parents of registered pupils or thirty of the parents of registered pupils at the school (whichever is the lower number).
- The meeting must be for the purpose of discussing a matter relating to the school.
- Should meetings be requested/held there will be no more than three meetings held during the school year in which the (initial) petition is received.
- There are enough school days remaining in the school year for the meeting to be held in line with the requirements of the Act.

Should a meeting be held it will be open to all parents of registered pupils at the school, the Headteacher and other persons invited by the Governing Body.

Before I finish can I apologize to our current Year 6 for not being able to give them the end of their Primary education that they deserve but wish them every success when they move to their Secondary schools in September.

SCHOOL AIMS

During 2019-20, school leaders, together with the governing body, undertook a full review of the school mission statement, motto, logo and aims together with staff, pupils, parents and other stakeholders. This was to ensure that these fundamental elements of the school identity remained current and reflected the changes of direction brought about by the national education reform agenda. Consequently a number of updates were introduced as follows:

Vision Statement: In an ever-changing world, our goal is to nurture, inspire, support and challenge all pupils using enjoyable, meaningful and diverse learning experiences so that they may reach their full potential.

Mission Statement: Our mission statement illustrates how we will work towards the achievement of our vision statement. It demonstrates our commitment to the curriculum reform agenda for Wales and our firm intention to secure the four purposes at the centre of our life and work as a school.

- To embed a safe, supportive and stimulating environment to nurture and promote the health and wellbeing of all pupils and staff.
- To engage fully and responsibly as active, respectful citizens of an inclusive local, national and global community.
- To encourage creative, critical and collaborative skills, embracing challenges and celebrating achievements of all pupils and staff.
- To establish a learning community where all pupils and staff are confident to express ideas, take risks and reflect, whilst acquiring new knowledge and skills to challenge themselves to achieve the highest standards.

The school logo underwent a slight re-fresh, shown on the front page of this document. This will gradually replace the previous logo on signage, documentation and uniforms.

SCHOOL PROSPECTUS

A school prospectus is updated annually in line with Welsh Assembly Government guidelines and is initially distributed to every family when their child enters Maes yr Haul Primary. Any family wishing

ACTIVITIES, ACHIEVEMENTS AND COMMUNITY LINKS

The activities of our normal academic year were significantly curtailed when all schools were closed from 23rd March due to the Coronavirus pandemic.

- The School Council continue to play an active role in school activities and decision making. Every
 class in the school has a democratically elected representative on the school council. During the
 school closure, the school council supported a fitness challenge for all pupils at home, deciding
 to give families the opportunity to raise money for Ty Hafan and NHS Wales
- A number of other pupil committees meet throughout the year, including Criw Cymraeg, Digital Leaders, Sports Council and Eco-Committee. All of these groups play a valuable role in the continual development of specific areas of pupil interest across the school.
- Links with the community are strong with very good partnership work between Maes yr Haul and Bridgend Rotary, Broadlands Residents Association, our local PCSOs and the all Wales police core programme provision.
- Pastor John Orchard of Grace Church visits school regularly to take collective worship as well as running an after school club on Tuesdays.
- Staff recognise and celebrate the achievement of pupils through weekly award assemblies held on Fridays. Class teachers select at least one Seren yr Wythnos (Star of the Week) and pupils also earn certificates for progress in areas such as literacy and numeracy programmes.
- The PFA continue to work hard to raise funds and support the school The well established Christmas Fayre was once again very successful as are the discos that continue to be the main source of income for the PFA.
- Pupils throughout the school enjoyed a wide range of experiences through visits to other places and also visitors to the school. This year, these have included;
 - Visits to a range of local venues including Gwili and Brecon Mountain Railways, Bushcraft Adventure, New Theatre Cardiff, Techniquest.
 - Our school choirs gave performances at Cymanfa Ganu, Bryntirion, St David's Church Carol
 Service in Laleston and the Sony, Bridgend.
 - Our choir children also made another highly successful and enjoyable visit to Disneyland Paris in March for their St Davids Day festival, returning just as Covid19 started to impact around the world, including nearby areas of France.
 - The summer residential trips arranged for Years 4 and 6 unfortunately both had to be cancelled.

CURRICULUM ORGANISATION

Maes yr Haul provides all children with a broad and balanced curriculum throughout the foundation phase and key stages two. We use a variety of strategies and methodologies to develop a broad range of knowledge, skills and understanding for all pupils. Children are given opportunities to develop their learning through combinations of whole class, group, paired and individual activities.

Through these, we want all our children to enjoy their learning and experience success and achievement at school. We aim to achieve this through high standards of learning and teaching within a happy, structured and caring environment.

In the foundation phase and at key stage 2 we deliver learning through a topic based approach. Topics enable us to provide a holistic approach to the four purposes of education in Wales, identifying relevant skills, concepts, knowledge and ideas across the areas of learning and experience and bringing them together in a cohesive way.

The curriculum in our school is designed to provide access and opportunity for all children who attend the school. If necessary we adapt the curriculum to meet the needs of individual children following consultation with parents.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

The school is mainly Christian in character and recognises a broad range of other religions, faiths and beliefs. There is a collective act of worship each day. Children may be withdrawn from Religious Education lessons and/or collective worship on religious grounds if their parents so request in writing.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR PUPILS WITH ADDITIONAL LEARNING NEEDS (ALN)

ALN provision at Maes yr Haul is very good and the ALN staff team are a strong feature of the school. The local authority recognises much of our ALN work as best practice. Our ALN policy statement explains agreed procedures for identifying, assessing and teaching children with additional needs. Each child has an individual learning plan with specific objectives and targets which are regularly monitored. Parents and pupils are included in the regular review meetings which focus on pupil progress and future educational provision.

Additional learning needs financial resources this year were allocated to

- 25% of support for Special Needs Support Assistants
- Non contact time for the ALNCo to carry out her role
- Additional resources to support differentiated work

Primary pupils having additional needs within BCBC are not usually statemented as support is available without going through the statementing process.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The School Improvement Plan (SIP) represents the vision for improvement in the form of targets and actions and ensures a commitment to raise achievement in all areas of school life. Our plans have continued to build upon our existing strengths, as identified in our Estyn inspection (May 18) and focus on areas for further development, particularly working towards the new Curriculum for Wales in readiness for 2022. The new curriculum will be structured through six 'Areas of Learning and Experience', referred to below as AoLEs. The improvement plan targets for 2019-20 were:

Target 1: AoLE Focus - Health & Wellbeing

To promote and improve the profile / quality of provision for Health & Wellbeing for staff and pupils throughout the school.

Target 2: AoLE Focus - Welsh Language

To raise standards of pupil's Welsh oracy and profile throughout the school.

Target 3: AoLE Focus - Expressive Arts

To improve quality of teaching and provision to develop the Expressive Arts AoLE

The school improvement plan is carefully monitored and progress reported by school staff and the Governing Body. Good progress had been made towards meeting the set targets up to the point of school closure (20th March 2020). However, further progress in that work has been limited within the context of school closures as school staff and leaders have had to prioritise other matters in relation to operation of the hub, provision of home learning and other relevant responses to Coronavirus pandemic.

THE LANGUAGE OF CURRICULUM DELIVERY

Whilst the main language of instruction is English, pupils in the foundation phase and key stage 2 are encouraged to speak Welsh to their peers and other adults whenever possible. There is a comprehensive development and progression programme in place for Welsh language development, and a 'Helpwr Heddiw' is employed in each classroom. The teaching of Welsh language is largely focussed on the development of oracy skills, but with an increasing emphasis on reading and writing in Welsh as children mature and gain confidence.

We give pupils the opportunity to experience Welsh culture and heritage wherever possible. Welsh is taught as a second language, there is no provision for any subject to be taught through the medium of Welsh. Pupils for whom English is an additional language (EAL) are catered for according to their needs with input from appropriate personnel.

Pupils' attainment is assessed using National Curriculum Level Descriptors by teachers throughout key stage 2 in Oracy, Reading and Writing. These levels are provided to the Comprehensive school in readiness for transition of pupils.

STAFF DEVELOPMENT

The staff are the most important resource of the school and all staff attended courses and in-service training in line with the priorities in the school improvement plan. A firm commitment, led by the Headteacher, is given at school to continuing professional development for all staff members.

SCHOOL POLICIES

The school has a large number of Policy documents covering both curriculum and non-subject areas. These documents are reviewed and revised by staff and governors on a rolling programme to reflect changing legislation, procedures and approaches. Further information is available by contacting the office during school time.

COMMUNITY FOCUSED SCHOOLS

A community-focused school is one that 'provides a range of services and activities', often beyond the school day, to help meet the needs of its pupils, their families and the wider community. Across Wales many schools already provide some community services including adult education, study support, ICT facilities and community sports programmes'. The development of community-focused

schools is not just a short-term project or initiative, but a real opportunity for schools and communities to work together in new ways for the future benefit of children, young people and adults.

Maes yr Haul Primary School, positioned in the centre of Broadlands, engages in a range of community focused activities. These include but are not limited to: breakfast club, a range of after school clubs, police involvement, SAFE project, family literacy and numeracy activities, transition activities with Bryntirion Comprehensive, cluster activities and outdoor adventurous activities amongst many others. GIFTS TO THE SCHOOL

The Governors are indebted to the Parents and Friends Association for their hard work in fund raising through a variety of events including half-termly discos, the Christmas Fete and other activities that continued until the date of school closure and were planned for the remainder of the school year.

PUPIL COMMITTEES

School councillors have been involved in considering improvements to the outdoor provision, reviewing the school aims and logo and developing a wellbeing kit for pupils. They have actively supported several fund-raising events during the year, raising money for good causes including Velindre Hospital, Comic Relief and Children in Need. The eco-committee continued to be very active and continue to promote all things 'eco' across the school, successfully renewing our Platinum Eco-Schools award. The Criw Cymraeg has continued to promote increased usage of Welsh language throughout the school and all staff and pupils are working towards completing the bronze award of the Siarter laith scheme during 2019-20. Digital leaders have continued to support the creative use of ICT to support learning throughout the school and also helping the teachers to keep up with the demands of ever-changing technology.

SPORTING ACHIEVEMENTS

This year, pupils have continued to enjoy and participate in a number of different sports, including including cross-country, netball, rugby, football. Most of the competitive aspects of these sports had either not started of not been completed by the time of the closure of schools in March. We continued to encourage pupils to stay fit and healthy during 'lockdown' and teachers have provided support and guidance to pupils to help maintain physical and mental health through these challenging times.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR DISABLED PUPILS

The Governing Body is mindful of the requirements of the Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) 1995 and The Special Needs and Disability Act (SENDA) 2005 in drawing up the School Improvement Plan and the day to day operation of the whole site.

The school is committed to ensuring that all pupils are able to participate in the school curriculum and (where they desire) in activities such as after school clubs, leisure/sporting events and

educational visits. All aspects of accessibility, including access to written information are included in the planning process to ensure that disabled pupils or adults will not be treated less favourably than other pupils and adults.

ATTENDANCE

The school places strong emphasis on good attendance. **REMEMBER** - Success starts by being in school. Parents should note that Welsh Assembly guidelines state that taking children on holidays during term time is not an entitlement for parents and all such absences need to be applied for in advance.

ADMISSION / TRANSITION ARRANGEMENTS

Admissions are made in line with the Local Authority's admissions procedures. Every school has a published admissions number (PAN) which determines the number of school places available. Many year groups are over the published admissions number. Bridgend County Borough Council is the Admissions Authority for Maes yr Haul Primary. The schools admission arrangements are therefore, operated in line with the Authority's policy on school admissions.

Pupils will usually remain in the school until they complete year six and then transfer to secondary school. This school is a feeder school for Bryntirion Comprehensive School, however, pupils may apply to attend any secondary school they choose subject to compliance with the Authority's admissions policy.

COMPLAINTS

The governors sincerely hope that any concerns and problems can be addressed by discussion with either teachers, the Headteacher and/or admin staff prior to becoming an issue for the attention of the Governing Body and the local authority. The complaints policy sets out the agreed procedures for handling complaints and is available on the school website or directly from the school upon request.

FABRIC OF THE BUILDING / TOILETS

The school is a modern well resourced building offering good learning spaces and adequate play areas including a sports field. There are an appropriate number of toilet facilities for the number of staff and pupils throughout the school, including arrangements for children and adults with disabilities. The school employs contract cleaners to clean all areas of the school.

HEALTHY EATING & DRINKING

The school encourages parents to provide healthy options for pupils in both morning breaks and lunches. Pupils are taught about the benefits of healthy lifestyles including strategies such as '5 a day' and operate a Healthy Tuck Shop. Pupils are also encouraged to bring water bottles to school. School dinners provide a range of healthy choices for pupils, are freshly prepared and well balanced.
